This will be in effect for the 2017 AAA Provincial Championships.

- a) Previous Match Result: the winner of the match between two teams tied in points shall be awarded the higher position (not applicable if three (3) or more teams are tied).
- b) If there remains equality among two or more teams, the team with the higher goal difference (which means "goals for" less "goals against") shall assume the higher position. A positive goal difference always takes precedence over a negative one. Goal difference shall be calculated by subtracting Goals conceded from Goals scored. A maximum of five (5) goals shall be awarded in each game. (Example: a 5-0 score (5 goal difference), a 7-1 score (5 goal difference), a 7-3 score (4 goal difference. Goal difference will only be used for the matches between the teams that are tied.
- c) If this number is the same, then the team having the least number of "goals against" shall assume the higher position.
- d) If this number is the same, then the team having the greatest number of wins shall assume the higher position.
- e) If this number is the same, then the teams shall compete in a shootout competition

Tournament info:

Cards—make sure that the score and the cards are done! Check with the Umpire about the card and what it was for!! Still have to sign for the score!!

Proxy Votes --- Are we going to use this---Do we need a Motion deadline?? -- We need to have an online motion venue with discussion available and then a call on the question and electronic voting!! These meetings then only deal with the tournament and the coaches' discussion about the tourney!!

Appendix A

Fraser Valley Zone AAA Representative Report November 2016

Administration: Michelle Savich from Sardis Senior Secondary School volunteered in September 2016 to be the Commissioner for Field Hockey in the Zone. Kim Eagle remained as the field co-ordinator as she has excellent contacts with Surrey Parks who administer most of the fields upon which our league and championships are played. Sadly the news about participation of schools in the zone is not as promising. In 2015/6 there were 18 schools at the AAA level but this year that number has shrunk to 13. Partly this is due to a few schools, who have been AAA in the past electing to play at the AA level and partly it is due to the more marginal programs shutting down. The zone still retains about 25 percent of all schools at the AAA level.

Our financial position in the zone remains sound.

Leagues: Our Zone is divided into two conferences, North which includes the six schools north of the impenetrable barrier called the Fraser River and South which had seven schools. There are also programs at Maple Ridge and Agassiz which do not really fit in either zone. Sadly two schools from the South dropped to AA after our competitive season started which complicated our league. The North Zone league results were Gleneagle, Charles Best, Heritage Woods and Riverside finishing in that order. In the South South Delta finished atop the list, Sardis and Sullivan tied for second and then Panorama and Chilliwack also tied. The results of a complicated tie breaking procedure left Chilliwack as the team not to advance to the Valley Championships. Four schools from the North and four from the South qualified for the Fraser Valley Championships on Oct 26/27 at Tamanawis Park. From this event South Delta (champions) and 3 other schools (Gleneagle, Charles Best, Sullivan Heights) received berths to the AAA tournament. The fifth place school (Heritage Woods) lost the wildcard game against Eric Hamber so did not advance to the tournament.

Challenges: The number of artificial surfaces in the Valley has now increased to the point where no games are played on grass. There are enough time slots to accommodate all our league games without conflict. Nearly all practices are also on water or field turf as well unless there are conflicts with other sports and/or transport issues. Umpiring is an on-going challenge for league games. Fortunately, we have been able to get sufficient rated umpires for our Championships so in the level of officiating at this event has been very good. There is not much stability in the Zone with a number of the school programs coming and going. However the trend is not positive as the total number of players is shrinking. This fact mirrors the decline in enrollment with many of the hockey clubs in the zone. On a positive note, the schools that played this season have a committed core of coaches and players so that hopefully this trend can be stopped and hopefully reversed. - * Burnaby had 4 AAA teams (NW, Moscrop, Central and Mountain), but none challenged NS for a berth at Provincials. Big change from recent years, when Burnaby/NW was not able to field any AAA teams. Good news.

Season Summary – The NS teams all played each other once. The top 4 teams are quite closely matched. Handsworth came out as #1 seed, Carson #2 and WVSS #3. All games were played on either field turf or water based turf (Rutledge). Argyle, Handsworth, WVSS, and Carson all participated in tournaments (Polar-Bear, Bridgman, and/or UBC). Sentinel did not as they had a short-bench all season. There was no other cross-over play with AA teams (such as Collingwood).

- * Jr. teams can choose Div 1. or Premier
- * Sr. teams are dived by size AAA or AA

Report:

The Island has been somewhat consistent with the numbers of AAA teams registered. North Island had 6 teams this year (Shawnigan Lake School, Cowichan Secondary Senior/Junior, Dover Bay Secondary, Vanier Secondary and Frances Kelsey Secondary). South Island has 4 teams (Mt. Doug Secondary, Oak Bay Secondary Senior/Development, Reynolds Secondary). It has been wonderful having some junior or developmental squads form in the last few years, this bodes well for future years as these athletes are getting the opportunity to play while keeping the competition at more equal level between teams. Similar to last year, there was a tournament held for both AA teams and developmental AAA teams.
